RHETORICAL DEVICES

Alliteration	Allusion
Another name for alliteration is tongue twisters; one after the other share the first few, initial consonant sounds. E.g. She sells seashells on the seashore.	Every time you make a reference to some places, events, or a person you are making an allusion. E.g. I'm not Sherlock Holmes to figure that out.
Amplification	Analogy
Repeating the same word one after the other, combined with an adjective or two makes it seems stronger, more significant. E.g. His face is red, so so red.	Sometimes the easiest way to explain things is to strike a parallel with some other thing that is quite similar to it. E.g. She is as pale as a ghost.
Anaphora	Antanagoge
Anaphora is defined as repeating a single word or a phrase in successive phrases. E.g. Some glory in their birth, some in their skill, some in their wealth.	An antanagoge is when you combine a positive and a negative statement together. E.g. This summer season was dry, but not as dry as the one back in 2012.
Antimetabole	Antiphrasis
Repeating words in verse order is what antimetabole is all about. E.g. Eat to live, not live to eat.	This device is used for ironic, sarcastic and humoristic effect. It usually makes fun of opposites. E.g. A really ugly painting, such a Mona Lisa, or a very slow person, Usain Bolt.
Antithesis	Appositive
Any time you make a connection between two events, people or things you are using this rhetorical device E.g. Love, is ideal, marriage real.	If you want to describe a noun better, with another noun, you are using appositive E.g. Alexander of Macedonia, master general.
Enumeration	Enumeration is when you try to make some sort of point by numbering things one after the other. E.g. The salesgirl lists every feature the item has in an attempt to make you agree with them

Exploring Poetic Form and Structure

Evaluation and Adaptation of Coursebook

Evaluation and Adaptation—according to the EFL Senior High School Strategy—External and Internal Courses. Evaluation 1. introduction Teaching material plays an important role in EFL classroom. With the rapid development and effectiveness of materials publishers, the variety of published material for English Language Teaching (ELT) has increased on the market makes selecting the right coursebook a challenging task (Cunningworth, 1996, p. 6).

However, there is no coursebook can be absolutely ideal for a particular group of learners (Cunningworth, 1996). Evaluation and selection of suitable material would be essential and important issues for language teachers. Each group of learners has its own needs and language teachers should choose suitable materials that best fit the learners' needs in terms of the purpose of the course. Learners' language proficiency, learners' learning styles and the aim of the material (Allwright 1998, p. 9) also suggests that the role of materials should switch from teaching material to "learning material". David (2001) conducts a cross-specific questionnaire survey to identify learners' needs so as to "name in learners a level of interests, involvement, and enjoyment that would not be possible to achieve with textbook-driven courses (p. 7). In this view, when evaluating materials, more emphasis needs to be put on the learners to satisfy their needs and interest.

This paper will present ways of material evaluation based on previous researches. Then, a coursebook, "Ling Teng English Reader for Senior High School Volume 1" (Liu & Tam, W.S., 2005) will be evaluated in terms of the internal and external approach to material evaluation (McDonald & H. Shaw, 1998).

In addition, two tasks from the coursebook will be adapted to be more appropriate for the teaching context that I work in. Finally, I would app to involve teachers' notes for these two adapted tasks. While reading a retrospective assessment of this coursebook, the paper aims to gain insight into the coursebook development in the specific EFL pedagogical context.

Literature reviews on material evaluation/Materials evaluation is a new research area in language teaching profession. (Cunningworth, 1996; Tomlinson, 1998; McGrath, 2002; Graves, 2003). This area will be in connection with many different issues in language teaching; for example, the course design, curriculum development, or school management. For language teachers, it is time consuming to design or write their teaching materials specifically for their learners (Cunningworth, 1996).

Thus, a mixture of using a coursebook and self-made materials would be a possible solution; however, choosing a suitable coursebook for the specific group of learners is not an easy task. Cunningham (1998) has claimed four essential guidelines that coursebooks should follow in order to have a better interaction with learner:




